## MRWA UPDATE ON AUDIT RECOMMENDATIONS WDA/45/24

#### **Report of the Chief Executive**

#### 1. Purpose of the Report

- 1.1 Members are reminded that the external auditor's report in November 2021 included statutory recommendations for the Authority to respond to.
- 1.2 One of the recommendations was that Members receive a report on progress against the other recommendations until agreed actions were implemented; this report responds to that recommendation.

#### 2. Update

- 2.1 The Authority has been working with the financial advisers KPMG to ensure the working papers supporting statements of accounts for 2018-19 and 2019-20 are clear and provide a trail through to the statutory statements of accounts which can be followed by the external auditor.
- 2.2 The Authority believes that at the time of writing the audit queries in respect of the 2018-19 accounts have been resolved and we are awaiting confirmation of that. Once the confirmation has been received, we will be in a position to finalise the publication of the Statement of Accounts. It is our expectation that once this set of accounts has been concluded the following accounts can begin to be agreed as the approach taken in the 2018-19 final statements will be carried forward into the next statements.
- 2.3 For the 2019-20 accounts we have continued to work alongside the audit team in response to their queries and clarifying any matters where they may need further information. A significant amount of audit work has been agreed and we would hope the completion of the prior year will enable the completion of the 2019-20 year to be concluded within a reasonable timescale thereafter.
- 2.4 This still leaves the later years to catch up and we are in discussion with the external financial adviser over how to proceed with the catch up,

- particularly in light of the Government's position on the approach to audit across the whole of local government.
- 2.5 It is worth reminding Members that the external financial adviser has commented that for the statements of accounts and working papers that they have reviewed so far, their overall comment is that the numbers in the accounts are in line with those that were submitted for audit some time ago, they have not advised of a need for any changes that would have a particular impact.
- 2.6 However, there remains an issue, unrelated to this authority that may impact on any of the audit years that we are concerned with. The Government and the Financial Reporting Council are concerned that across local government there continue to be more than 1,000 audit opinions outstanding, i.e. the audit is not completed. This is for a range of technical accounting and audit reasons, but also relates to a lack of capacity in in public sector audit across the board.
- 2.7 On the 30<sup>th</sup> July, the Minister of State for Housing, Communities and Local Government, Jim McMahon MP, laid a written ministerial statement in Parliament setting out proposals to tackle the local audit backlog in England.
- 2.8 The proposals, which are supported by all key local audit organisations, include setting a statutory 'backstop' date of 13 December 2024 to clear the backlog of unaudited accounts up to and including Financial Year 2022/23. The proposed legislation would include five further backstop dates up to and including financial year 2027/28 to allow assurance to be rebuilt over several audit cycles.
  - Financial years up-to-and-including 2022/23: 13 December 2024
  - Financial year 2023/24: 28 February 2025
  - Financial year 2024/25: 27 February 2026
  - Financial year 2025/26: 31 January 2027
  - Financial year 2026/27: 30 November 2027
  - Financial year 2027/28: 30 November 2028
- 2.9 A full copy of the proposals is included for members at Appendix 1 to this report.
- 2.10 The Government has continued the previous Government's consultation on the approach to this issue, and that consultation involves the prospect

of multiple years of accounts not being signed off by auditors. The proposal reflects a need to move forward, recognising that the delays have happened and seeking a way of normalising the relationship between local authority accounts and audit going forward. However, the consultation and planning for the way forward was not concluded before the election was called for June 2024 and so we await the outcome of the ballot to see how that will be taken forwards.

- 2.11 Meanwhile, whilst we will continue to work alongside our own auditors in seeking to ensure the Authority's accounts are all up to date and are audited, there is a probability that at least some of the Authority's accounts may be caught up in the new audit proposals. As the consultation reaches a conclusion and proposals are finalised, we will ensure that Members are informed of the likelihood that the Authority will be impacted by the approach.
- 2.12 As previously reported one of the Authority's staff has been given the opportunity for professional development and is currently in an early stage of training with CIPFA with a view to completing their accountancy training as a fully qualified CIPFA accountant. It is expected that the combination of the additional targeted support and the additional CIPFA qualified member of staff will contribute towards providing the additional resilience that the Authority needs to be better placed to support the production of the Financial Statements.
- 2.13 The auditor had identified that the cash reconciliation in the accounts production was incomplete. Working with the service provider, we are satisfied that the cash reconciliation provided to MRWA and reviewed by MRWA and the auditor is sufficient to satisfy the requirement for the bank reconciliation to be reviewed. The auditor will review the bank reconciliations provided and will provide their view in due course.
- 2.14 The auditor noted that the systems used by the Authority to support the production of the accounts needed to be reviewed. The Authority has been working closely with the service provider and their new accounting system is in place and is being implemented at the Authority. The new system, provided by AGRESSO, will make it simpler to track transactions and to summarise accounts, both for the annual statutory financial statements and for in year management accounts. The transition to the new approach has been taking place over recent weeks and should be fully in place before the Authority's budget setting process commences in full.

- 2.15 Separately the complex spreadsheet used to support the accounts production was reviewed and much simplified, so that the production of the accounts and the support for the auditor are made easier to follow.
- 2.16 The auditor has set out that the Authority should be updated at each meeting on the progress being made against each of his recommendations. This report forms the latest of those updates; Members will continue to receive an update on these recommendations as requested, until they are all implemented.
- 2.17 A separate report will be made to Members on the Auditors approach to their multiple year value for money conclusions.

#### 3. Risk Implications

3.1 The following risks have been identified in relation to the development and implementation of the Authority's corporate planning processes:
